


DOVER FLOWER CLUB - INSPIRED BY SUMMER

RIVER DOUR UPDATE

MICHAEL INNES

River Parish Council commissioned The Wild Trout Trust in April to make an advisory visit to the Dour in order to assess the watercourse and recommend practical and affordable actions to improve the habitat and eco-system.

You may be aware that Dour is a very sensitive water environment and is subject to low flows at times. Over the last four years we have lost all of the valuable aquatic plant Ranunculus or "Water Crowfoot". This plant is very important to for the wildlife of the river; it acts as an oxygenator to the water and important habitat for insects, invertebrates and our resident Brown Trout, as well as helping hold up water levels during low flow periods.

As well as being ecologically important, Water Crowfoot produces beautiful white and yellow flowers which breach the water during the summer and really add to the character to the river. As you read this update a summary of the W.T.T report has already been posted on the RiverParish website and should after reading this you would like a copy of the full document please apply as directed below.

If you wish to take an active interest in the conservation and restoration of our river Dour please let us know. River Parish Council with support from the White Cliffs Country Side Partnership will be creating a citizen project which you may like to volunteer for. We believe that the Dour deserves wider recognition among the local community and wish to help village residents to engage in its preservation.

HOW TO WATER WISELY

Summer in this part of the world can, as we know all too well, be frustratingly unpredictable. However, even if this year doesn't end up a blazing summer, this is the time when the garden and allotment is most likely to need some help with watering.

Watering might seem like a very simple task, but there are optimum ways to water, and save a LOT of effort. The first rule for watering - a bit like the first rule of Fight Club – is: don't water. Easy to say until you see the drooping plants and bone dry soil. But all may not be what it seems, read on for more.

Caring for your soil is pretty much the answer to all the woes of gardening including watering - and an organic, no dig, approach is a good starting point. Chemical additives might seem like a quick solution, but over time your soil will suffer. Soil health depends entirely on supporting the living organisms which go into making and maintaining it. The most basic rule for improving soil is that the more organic matter you can cram into it, the better. And the best thing about that rule is that you don't need to know what type of soil you have; all soil will be improved by adding organic matter. The more moisture-retentive a soil is, the less watering is needed, so the next step is to lock in moisture. Applying a mulch (a layer of organic matter such as compost, manure, cardboard, grass clippings - anything which was once a living thing) to the surface of the soil will help slow evaporation and keep that water where your plants need it – by their roots. Plants are well adapted to their environment; they have complex root systems that are the last word in retrieving water from soil. Even though to us a soil may seem dry, a plant is able to extract moisture through microscopic root hairs, which allow the plant to draw water from the soil by a process called osmosis. Think of sucking up a cool drink of water with a straw. Keep your plants well weeded as well – this means less competition for the water available to the plants you want to thrive.

Don't forget, the surface of the soil or mulch may well be completely dry – but before you get out the watering can, check what the soil is like beneath the surface. A couple of inches down, a happy soil will still be moist. In this case, resist the urge to water and conserve it for when the plants truly need it. Another benefit of this approach is that you will only need to water periodically, not daily. In fact, plants will benefit from a weekly long soak far more than a scattered spray daily. With periodic soaking, water has a chance to reach the deeper parts of the soil encouraging the plants to push their roots further down to find water, rather than producing roots nearer the soil surface where they risk becoming dependent on artificial watering and drying out quickly.

Sometimes plants like to 'play possum'. Check out a winter squash at the height of the day's heat and it will be drooping like it's dying of thirst. Don't be fooled. The plant's huge leaves are losing water through evaporation quicker than it can draw it up; come the cool of the evening, it will have perked up – no watering necessary. Just because you feel hot and thirsty, doesn't mean your plants do. Overwatering can actually be harmful, allowing essential plant nutrients to be washed out of the soil and creating potentially anaerobic (oxygen-free) soil conditions which roots can't tolerate.

If you must water (and you might not!) then try and use a watering can without its rose to get water to the roots of the plants.

Only use a rose when watering seeds and seedlings so you don't disturb their nascent roots. Water during the cooler parts of the day so water is absorbed by the soil, rather than evaporating with the sun's heat. Make sure there is a ridge of soil around plants to allow water to soak in rather than run off all over your feet. For plants grown undercover (and therefore in drier and hotter conditions) try filling an old wine bottle with water then plunge it in the soil firmly up to the bottle neck, near the roots of each plant. This allows water to seep out over a day or so – also useful if you're away.

Watering using a hose encourages us to waft the spray into the air, only damping down the top layer of soil rather than giving plants a good soaking. This surface moisture then simply evaporates away, providing little benefit to the plants at their roots.

And while we're on the subject of water being a precious resource, it's worth thinking about where you're getting your water. Are you simply turning on a tap? Mains water is a really essential service to have when gardening, but the cost of supplying that can be meteoric, especially if you're gardening at home on a water meter, or on an allotment where taps and pipes are leaky.

It's really worth considering putting in water collection systems if you haven't already got them. Wherever you have a structure with a roof, siphon off the collected rain fall into butts or other containers linked together. Avoid open containers which can become smelly with a build-up of organic matter. If that's the only option, provide a stick for wildlife to escape if they do fall in.

If you're currently relying on a tap, then consider switching to a water butt system to collect and store rainwater. Failing that, only use a tap and hose to fill up water butts which you can then take water from with a can. Failing that only water using a hose on a non-spray setting at the base of the plants that need it once a week. Failing that, just don't use a drip hose or leave the tap running unattended for hours.
